Powder actuator training coming soon ...

Powder-actuated nailers (ramset guns) are charged by a .22 caliber safety cartridge, each round creating enough force to drive a hardened nail into steel or concrete. The typical powder-actuated tool used in construction releases the nail at a velocity approaching 500 feet per second.

This technology was developed during WWII for the United States Navy to temporarily repair damage to ships by fastening steel plates over the damaged

Because of Australia's strict firearms laws, owners in Australia need to register their tools, and operators need to be trained and licensed.

Look for further training on powderactuated tools after the first of the year. Until then, treat the tools as you would a firearm - wear goggles and hearing protection, handle with respect and safety, never leave tools loaded and never point a loaded tool at another person.

RTL to introduce new fall protection standard

Coming soon: Lift training

Know what you're doing!

Much of the work that is performed in the field is done from an aerial lift. That is why keeping current on your training is of most importance.

RTL Safety Director Steve Gillman could very well be contacting you in the near future to remind you that you need to update your training.

In the meantime, here are five simple things to remember when using an aerial lift -

- 1) Stabilization- lift must be on firm level surface (unless outside) away from hazards that can cause instability, such as drop offs and holes.
- Fall protection- lifts must have guardrails installed to prevent workers from falling.
- 3) Positioning- lift has to be at least 10 feet away from electrical power-lines.
- 4) Maintenance- all lifts need to be inspected daily prior to use. (including water level in the batteries)
- 5) Training- any person using an aerial lift must be trained on how to use the equipment.



Aerial lifts are used for both interior and exterior tasks by RTL field staff. Some of you will be contacted soon as a reminder to update your training. In the meantime, use extreme caution when operating and occupying these useful tools.

Pigskin gobblers

Reports have been positive on the new Hilti screw magazine (right) that are gradually being replaced in the field. The new magazine requires little adjustment when using different size screws.

New screw magazines getting thumbs 'up' and high fives

The new Hilti screw magazines attach to the screw gun in the same manner as the old one, the difference is in the way the magazine feeds the screws. The new screws come on a rigid strip which are fed straight into magazine.

While the old strips had 50 screws, the new will have only 25.

This will result in more frequent reloading, however, these strips can be carried in your bags, and the new head doesn't require that you set screw length. The head will automatically adjust for this and you just need to fine tune the depth setting.

How to handle a work-related injury?

If someone is to suffer a workrelated injury, proper procedure on the jobsite is a must.

If the situation is an emergency, call "911" IMMEDIATELY.

In non-emergency situations, report all injuries to the job foreman immediately. If foreman is not available, the job superintendent is next in line. If not an option, Safety Director Steve Gillman (612.802.7843) should be notified.

If the injury requires additional treatment, the injured party must

be accompanied to the nearest Minnesota Occupational Health clinic, which is posted in the gang box, and Steve Gillman should be notified.

Injured parties are required to complete a post-accident drug screen, and will not be permitted to work until the results are received by the RTL office and found favorable. Also, all clinical documentation must be submitted to the RTL office indicating whether or not the injured is cleared to return to work.

Duck, duck good duck

Excellent recipe. A tip for those who want to eliminate the "wild game" taste as much as possible is to soak the duck breasts in salted ice water for about an hour before using. I suggest about a Tablespoon of salt per quart. Make sure to use ice water as it will draw out blood. Then rinse the breasts thoroughly and quickly pat dry with paper towel before adding to the marinade. This recipe is a keeper!

1/4c Worcestershire

- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- ½ teaspoon hot sauce
- 2 tablespoons minced garlic
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 8 skinned/boned duck breast halves
- Stir together worchestershire sauce, olive oil, hot sauce, garlic and pepper. Add the duck breast and toss well to coat. Cover

and marinate in the refrigerator for at least 30 minutes to overnight.

- 2) Preheat grill for medium high heat
- 3) Grill the duck to desired doneness, about 5 minutes per side for medium well, depending on the size of the breast and temperature of the grill.

 - 5) Eat.

Silica enforcement is at hand

New standards in place in June, enforced Sept. 23

Not only did that date bring the beginning of the Minnesota duck hunting opener, it also is the start of the MN OSHA enforcement of the new silica standard. Along with it being overly hot with a ton of mosquitos trying to extract the life blood from eager hunters, so too will MN OSHA be hot to extract information from construction workers trying to comply with the new standard that has been put in place.

And the information that they will be looking for are your knowledge of the "action level" of 25 micrograms per cubic meter, and that the PEL (permissible exposure level) of 50 micrograms per cubic meter.

What is and where is your respirable silica plan located? What information is in it? Knowing that the competent person is an individual who can identify foreseeable silica hazards. Understanding that the word HEPA is an abbreviation for High-efficiency particulate air filtering system. All of these are things that have been covered in the silica training that you have received, and if for any reason you are a little bit sketchy on understanding this information or have any questions please feel free to contact Steve Gillman at 612-802-7843.

In June, RTL Construction went the

extra mile and performed the required air monitoring to help gain an understanding of silica exposure on site, and the exposure levels for routine tasks performed by RTL employees were relatively low. Still, measures have been put in place to further control silica exposure.

Silica is a mineral found in many construction materials, such as sand, concrete, stone and mortars. Inhaling small silica particles causes diseases like silicosis, an incurable lung disease that can lead to disability and death. Silica also causes lung cancer, COPD, and kidney disease.

Warm up to winter

One popular, long-standing and reputable forecasting outlet makes a bold prediction ... Winter will be warmer than normal.

Ideal harvest moon

Some have theorized that the second full moon after the autumn equinox is believed to trigger the peak in rutting activity among the coveted white tail deer. This year's "Rutting Moon" is expected earlier than last year, falling on Nov. 4 compared to Nov. 16 in 2016.

Last year's total white tail deer harvest for firearms, archery and muzzleloader was 173,213, up from 159,343 in 2015 and the highest total since 2012. Those numbers are well short of the 290,525 mark in 2003, the highest in the last 22 years.

National Weather Service and Old Farmer's Almanac are predicting a mild, gentle winter. Farmer's Almanac is saying "totally wrong."

The Farmer's Almanac's long range formula has used mathematical and astronomical inputs since 1818, and is pointing towards a very long, cold and snow-filled winter, with "teeth chattering cold" and "plentiful snow."

The Old Farmer's Almanac says a milder-than-normal forecast is due to a decrease in solar activity and the expected arrival of a weak El Nino that will prevent cold air masses from lingering in the north.

The biggest white-tailed deer recorded in Minnesota was a 500pound buck ... A whitetail's home range is about 1 square mile. There are nearly 500,000 firearms deer hunters in Minnesota.

Last year, 35 percent of Minnesota firearm hunters successfully harvested a deer. About 53 percent were antlered bucks ... 70 percent of Minnesota's firearms deer harvest typically occurs during the first three or four days of the season.

The average hunter spends five days afield during Minnesota's firearms deer season.

Fall protection in one of three steps

There are many methods to guard yourself from that fall

Fall Protection at RTL is something that we deal with every day.

It can sometimes be complicated, and other times be as simple as putting on a harness and connecting it to an anchorage point. There are many different measurements to remember, but the measurement you need to remember the most is 6-feet.

At any point when you are working above 6-feet you need to protect yourself from falling. There are many different ways to achieve this, and if you don't know how, you need to ask.

MEANS AND METHODS

Guard rails – guard rails are typically built out of 2x4's. They need to be able to withstand 200 lbs. of force, with a toe board from the ground up to 4"; a midrail at 21"; and a top rail at 42". Upright posts holding the rails can only be a maximum of 8' apart.

Harness and lanyard – The harness and lanyard need to be inspected daily for rips or tears.

The lanyard can be the typical, retractable, or a vertical lifeline and rope grab. Each of these need to be inspected each day prior to use.

Anchorage point – The different types of these are a roof plate, beam clamp, beam strap or the mobile fall arrest cart. Any anchorage point that you use needs to be able to withstand 5,000 lbs. of force.

If you have questions about fall protection on your site, ask your foreman. If they don't have the answer call the office and ask to be put in contact with the safety director, Steve Gillman.

Your safety is RTL's main concern.

RTL's insurance company recently advised us to discontinue the use of radios and earbuds altogether after one of its inspectors witnessed potential hazards on our sites.

RTL will be taking the stance of still allowing radios and earbuds under following guidelines -

- Radios need to be at a volume to where talking can be heard without having to raise your voice.
- Only one earbud at a time. The allows the user to hear alarms from equipment around them.

Non-compliance could result in a complete ban of radios and earbuds.
